We are committed to providing vocabulary rich, diverse reading material across the curriculum to help our children to develop their knowledge of themselves and the world in which they live.

We understand the significance of parents and carers in supporting their children to develop both word reading and comprehension skills so we endeavour to build a home-school partnership which enables parents and carers to have the confidence to support their children with reading at home.

Our English curriculum is based on CLPE's The Power of Reading and uses high-quality children's literature as our 'core texts' for each term to develop both reading comprehension and writing composition. These diverse texts are carefully chosen and include a range of genres, text types and authors.

Teachers regularly read with their classes so the children get to know and love a range of high-quality diverse texts. This is in addition to the books that they take home. This helps to extend children's vocabulary and comprehension, as well as supporting their writing.

We have a strong focus on language development for our children because we know that speaking and listening are crucial skills for reading and writing in all subjects. We provide a text rich environment, in order to encourage a positive culture of reading throughout all classes and promote reading for pleasure.

We have a well-stocked, attractive library which all children access regularly where they can access a wide range of books, both fiction and non-fiction to help embed their love of books, stories and reading. Classrooms also have vibrant and inviting book corners. Displays around the school inspire and express our strong and positive reading culture.

We believe in offering a wide variety of opportunities to our pupils and therefore try to engage with a variety of activities throughout the year including holding an annual Book Fair, celebrating World Book Day, encouraging children to take part in the local library Summer Reading Challenge and all classes take part in Buster's Book Club weekly.

Through termly pupil progress meetings, teachers and SLT track attainment and progress in reading. Phonic assessments are completed at least six times a year to identify progress and any children needing extra support. We use the Burt Reading Test and NFER comprehension tests in KS2. All data is used purposefully to put appropriate measures into place which help to impact on pupil progress.
