Lunsford Primary School Improvement Action Plan 2023- 2024: Music

Priorities:

1. Effectiveness of Leadership and Management

To support staff wellbeing by continuing to implement the Charanga music scheme; reducing planning, resourcing and marking pressures.

To value students' opinions of the subjects through listening and responding to pupil voice.

2. Behaviour and Attitudes

Staff to develop their confidence and subject specific knowledge in music

Staff to feel confident using vocabulary linked to topic.

3. Quality of Education

To ensure Charanga Scheme is being delivered effectively through learning walks

4. Personal Development

To promote an understanding and respect for differences through celebrating diversity within our school community throughout the curriculum, through organising an African Drumming Workshop to come into the school- all years to participate.

Continue to allow students a voice to impact school life through the use of pupil voice and questionnaires.

To promote music creatively during themed inspiration days- inspiration day I- music themed

Music monitors (Yr 6) to set up music for when the children are walking into assemblies.
